


Protagonist – Reformed

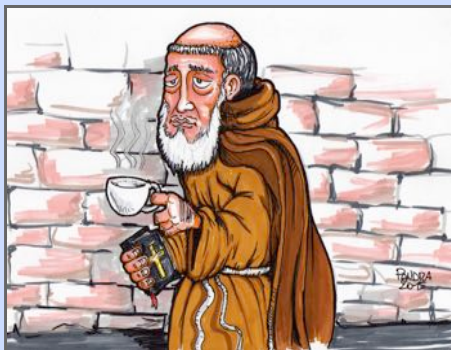
Character – Catholics

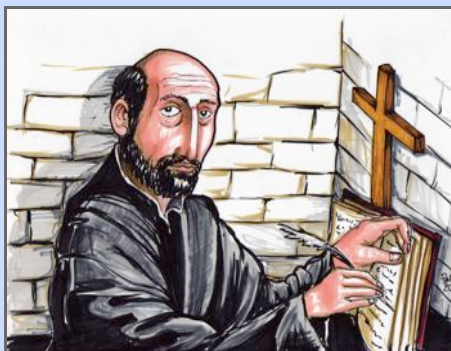
Character - Catholics

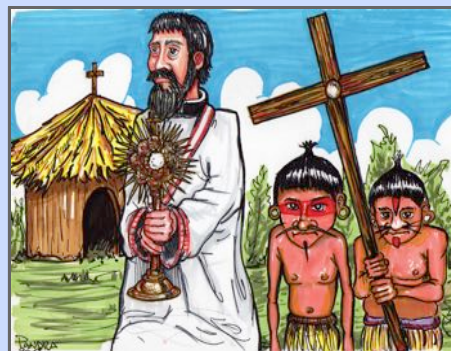
Character - Catholics

Filibuster



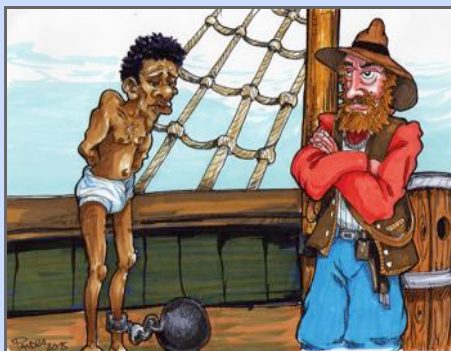
Character - Pirates

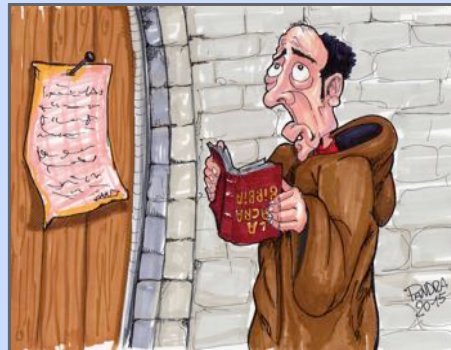
Character - Reformed

Lutheran




Character - Reformed

Huguenots




Character - Reformed

St. Peter's Basilica




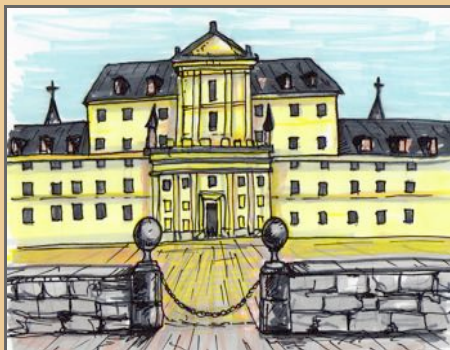
Bastion - Catholics

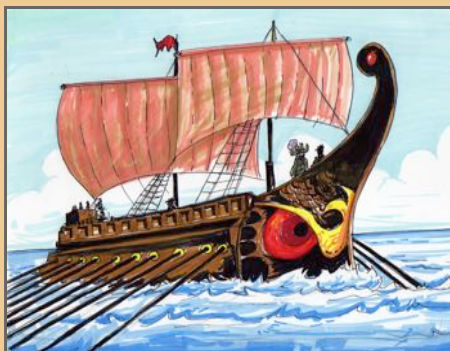
Bastion - Demonic

Caribbean Sea



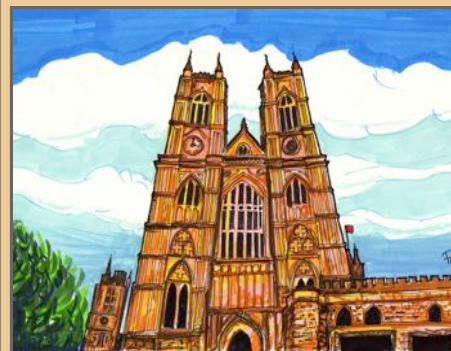

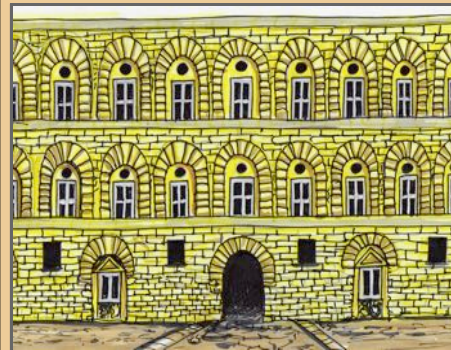
